NEWS FROM COUNCILPERSONS JOHN GAWLAS & BILL NICKELS

With continued cuts in state shared revenues from Lansing announced in early December, sufficient money to operate city government continues to be the most serious problem facing Ypsilanti. More cuts in city services will likely result from this recent loss of state money. It is in this context that the Council accepted the Blue Ribbon Finance Committee's recommendation to study an income tax. This would be an analysis of potential revenues and concurrent reduction in the millage rate including the financial impact on various classes of taxpayers (homeowners, renters, senior citizens, businesses, non-resident workers). It is estimated that such a study would provide a final report by April 2005.

One of City Council's goals is to pursue "strategies for improving the physical condition of neighborhoods and increasing the rate of home ownership". Council is considering zoning ordinance revisions that will down zone Cross Street east of Oakwood and the area immediately east of Normal Park. The existing zoning effectively provides incentive for high-density income producing property over owner occupied residences. If that incentive is not erased then the "playing field" will always be tilted in favor of those who simply want to make money in the neighborhood versus those who want to live in it and enjoy its qualities as a residential district. It is expected that down zoning will in the long run encourage owner occupied housing and reduce the problems in these areas.

A review of the confusing array of parking restrictions enacted to deal with EMU commuter parking has led to a more holistic proposal to address this issue. Our Police Department is requesting the neighborhood associations bordering EMU to examine commuter parking on their residential streets. The proposed strategy is to uniformly use "parking by residential permit only" as a method of controlling commuter parking on residential streets. The Police Department asked that neighborhood associations report the streets where residential permit parking is desired to their neighborhood COPAC representative.

The Standard/BP gas station at the corner of Owendale and Washtenaw recently purchased the residential lot to the south of the service station with the intent to use the lot for business purposes. The City of Ypsilanti won a Temporary Restraining Order preventing this use which would be very detrimental to that residential neighborhood. Further legal actions by the City will follow.

WINTER WALKING

Normal Park residents can enjoy walking outdoors in the crisp, clear air of winter by following a few tips adapted from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration:

- Dress in layers and wear boots with non-skid soles. Wear a bright scarf or hat or reflective gear so drivers can see you.
- Walk on sidewalks where possible. If sidewalks are covered with snow and ice and you must walk in the street, walk against the flow of traffic and close to the curb.
- When walking with children, dress them in bright or reflective clothing. Keep children in front of you and as close to the curb as possible if walking in the street.

With weather-appropriate footwear and warm clothing, there are many trails and walkways in Washtenaw County that are safe year-round. Ypsilanti's Rolling Hills County Park and Dexter's Hudson Mills Metro Park maintain their trails through the winter; both charge a small entry fee. Ann Arbor's Gallup Park has free maintained trails. The EMU campus and downtown Ypsilanti also keep sidewalks clear (and offer a place to stop for a warm drink!).

If you prefer a warmer walking location, Briarwood Mall is open to the public starting at 7:00 a.m. with no fee for walking. The Meri Lou Murray Recreation Facility has an indoor track that is open to the public for a fee. YOGA IN NORMAL PARK BEGINS AGAIN

After a very successful first session, yoga is beginning again this month. The new, 8-week session began on Thursday, January 6. Like the last session, there are beginner and intermediate classes. Both classes are taught by Karen Beeri. Unlike last time, the classes will be held at Chapelle Elementary School on Wallace, just south of Congress. Classes are every Thursday through February 24. The beginners' class begins at 6:00 and the intermediate class begins at 7:30. Mats and blocks are available for those who don't have their own.

Everyone is encouraged to attend, even if you've never done yoga. You do not have to sign up for the entire series; you can come for as many or as few classes as you like. You can pay in advance or pay each night at the door. Since you'll be reading this newsletter a few days after the session has begun, we'll only charge \$10 per class if you pay for at least four classes at once. If you pay for an individual class, it's regularly \$12 at the door.

Yoga is a great way to fight the "winter blahs." It will get your blood flowing, improve your mood (even if you're already in a good mood!), increase both your strength and flexibility, and enhance your overall health. Our classes are designed to be inclusive. No matter how athletic you are or are not, our yoga program will help you. It's a great part of a healthy lifestyle. Best of all, you can walk to the class!



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COMMUNITY GARDENING IN NORMAL PARK

Although the growing season has ended, work hasn't stopped at the Recreation Park Community Garden (RPCG). In November, a group of hardy gardeners turned out to build a more permanent compost bin system. Volunteers helped with delivery of pallets, raking, building, and moving the huge pile of compost that had accumulated in the existing small round plastic bin. Compost from the garden will be rotated through the three new attached bins over the next three years.

A changing of the guard also occurred at RPCG last fall, with Normal Park resident and life-long gardener Lisa Bashert taking over as garden coordinator. Jenna Bacolor, former RPCG coordinator, is moving to West Middle School, the newest community garden spot in Normal Park. She will remain connected to RPCG.

"Think of Jenna and me as a team," says Lisa. "We hope that the West Middle School Community Garden and RPCG will be like two peas in the Ypsi pod."

Plans for the new school and community garden at West Middle School are still taking shape. The staff at West Middle School is working with Amanda Edmonds at Growing Hope to create a sustainable garden that could include both vegetables and native plants. Also through Growing Hope, West Middle School is acquiring a greenhouse that will be located in one of the interior courtyards of the school. The greenhouse and garden will create opportunities for enhanced hands-on learning at West, as well as provide another way to connect with the Normal Park neighborhood. - The Senior Center may become a teaching site for gardening and nutrition classes sponsored by Growing Hope, a local non-profit dedicated to improving people's lives through gardening.
