NPNA GENERAL MEETING

The next NPNA General Meeting is at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, October 26th at the Senior/Community Center in Recreation Park.

With energy prices expected to rise to record levels this winter, opening your utility bill in the coming months may become a profile in courage. Yet even with rising prices, there are steps you can take to limit the increase in the cost of heating your house. Our featured guest speaker for October, Jacob Corvidae, the Green Programs Manager of WARM in Detroit, will talk to us about home energy efficiency and ways to keep your utility dollars from literally going out the window.

WARM promotes the development of resource efficient, affordable, healthy homes and communities through education, training and technical assistance. It began as an employment and training program teaching people weatherization and basic construction skills. The initials WARM stood for Weatherization And Retrofit Maintenance. Today WARM only



uses the acronym. In the past ten years WARM has increasingly become a technical assistance resource for nonprofit organizations building and rehabilitating affordable housing.

While the focus of WARM has been on affordable housing, the organization also works to provide workshops and training to community groups interested in energy efficiency. The training offers basic advice on ways to reduce energy usage and how to use sustainable "green materials" in making a house more energy efficient.

THE UPS AND DOWNS OF THIS YEAR'S COMMUNITY GARDENING SEASON

Almost one hundred people from the Normal Park, Midtown, and other neighborhoods became more connected to their community and to their food this season by gardening at one of our three local community gardens – Recreation Park, Midtown, and West Middle School. Many friendships were formed, gardening tips were shared, and vegetables and herbs were enjoyed through their efforts.

Unfortunately, two gardens – Midtown and West Middle School – drew the attention of vandals. At Midtown, a thief stole many perennial flowers and some vegetable plants. He was eventually caught and no further vandalism has occurred. At West Middle School, a plot full of pumpkins proved too enticing for vandals to pass. Besides throwing several pumpkins on the school, the vandals also destroyed some gardeners' trellises and a few vegetable plants. Although these vandals were not caught, no further damage has occurred at this garden either.

Despite the vandalism, lack of rain, and a few issues with bugs, all three gardens grew a bounty of vegetables, herbs and flowers. This year's Plant a Row for the Hungry program, which featured drop-off nights at each garden, netted over 220 pounds of fresh produce for Food Gatherers. Each garden dedicated at least one plot to PAR and many individual gardeners also contributed from their plots. Gardeners celebrated their efforts at an all-garden Harvest Party on October 16.

Garden organizers are already planning for the 2006 growing season. The registration deadline for a plot will be March 5, 2006. Forms and guidelines will be available on the Normal Park website in the late winter. For more information, call Jenna Bacolor at 483-1647 or
