NPNA GENERAL MEETING

The NPNA General Meeting is at 6:30 pm on Wednesday, January 25, 2006, at the Senior Center in Recreation Park.

In light of all that has happened in our neighborhood over the past few months - both good and bad - the NPNA board thought to stray from our tradition of bringing in a keynote speaker and, instead, turn the meeting into a time to simply be together and celebrate our community.

These past few months have been trying in many ways, with an attack in our neighborhood and news of other attacks in the city, the city's financial crisis, and threats to our neighborhood woods/open space by a proposed public school bus depot. Yet, in the wake of these events our neighborhood has come together in unprecedented ways, creating more community, more hope and more positive possibilities for the future.

As the news of the city's financial woes spread, residents have come together to create an ice rink in Recreation Park, which will provide much needed outdoor recreation opportunities for our families and youth. Others have worked with the Senior Center to think of ways to ensure that the building not only remains open, but that programming for our city's seniors continues. And still others voiced their opinions loudly and clearly to the Ypsilanti School Board in relation to the proposal to relocate the school bus depot to the open space adjacent to the woods on Congress Street. Our neighborhood now has three representatives on the newly formed "Bus Depot Relocation Committee" and they are working hard to find an alternative location.

Given all that has happened and is continuing to happen in our area, the NPNA board is taking a stronger advocacy role within the community. On January 25th, we'd like to share some of our ideas with you and, more importantly, we'd like to hear your ideas and get your feedback in regards to making positive change in Ypsilanti.

We will be joined that evening by two musical neighbors - Eric Moore and Gerry Butterwick - and we'll have yummy snacks for the whole family.

Please plan to join us on January 25th! We all need more opportunities to come together and eat yummy treats, hear music and talk a bit. We look forward to seeing you in a few weeks.

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RECREATION COMMISSION UPDATE - JAN 2006

The Recreation Commission was appointed by the Mayor, to help address the critical issues surrounding the elimination of recreation funding from the City's general budget. Two representatives from each ward serve on the Commission. This summer and fall the Commission focused on two areas: supporting "friends" groups that have helped to maintain recreation at the City's four main recreation facilities: the Senior Center, Parkridge Community Center, Rutherford Pool and the Freighthouse, and developing strategies to help make recreation programming sustainable into the future. The "friends" groups continue to do incredible work to keep recreational opportunities available to the community.

After facing a challenge to develop a core group that would support the Senior Center, a strong partnership has developed between NPNA, seniors and City staff. This group, led heroically by **Rebecca Dunkle**, has in just a few short months initiated a plan to keep the Senior Center open and growing. The City recently received a verbal commitment from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation for a \$20,000 match to the \$10,000 we are raising locally. In addition, the City signed a contract for the Senior Nutrition Program. These commitments will continue to keep the Senior Center in operation until July. Finally, Rebecca and the planning team are looking at a number of exciting partnerships, including one with Elder Wise a group that offers recreation programs for seniors and currently operates out of St Joseph Hospital.

Another recent exciting event at the Senior Center was a reception of the Intergenerational Project at the end of November. That project, led by City staff member Angel Coleman, culminated a series of activities between seniors and teens that began last March. The Senior Center was vibrant with about 100 community members as the teens and seniors shared their two tangible works: biographical stories produced through the "write-link" process, and wonderful images presented through a "photo-voice" project.

The Friends of Rutherford Pool (FORP) completed their 2005 season with tremendous success! An increase in attendance by over 30%, compared to 2004 meant revenues for the pool nearly matched expenses, which included a significant mechanical upgrade to the boiler. Adult lap swim and drop-in water polo were both well attended and FORP revamped a competitive swim team for youth this past season.

The Friends of the Freighthouse (FOFH) are working diligently to re-open the Freighthouse. FOFH has been working on several capital improvements and fund development opportunities. They are currently waiting on the go-ahead from the State Historic Preservation Office to begin work on a foundational beam, which when completed, should allow them to open the Freighthouse.

The Committee to Save Parkridge is pursuing several funding, programming and partnership opportunities. The group has been meeting actively since this summer. City staff, the Recreation Commission and community volunteers helped to raise \$38,000 to keep Parkridge open throughout the summer and fall. The Committee is currently working to put together a formal advisory committee, which may happen as early as January.

On the sustainability goal, the Recreation Commission is working with Vic Chaisson and David Clifford from Eastern Michigan University's Institute for the Study of Children, Families and the Communities. We are holding a regional conference on January 25th entitled Recreation 2026: A Community Roundtable on Working Together to Enhance the Quality of Life in Eastern Washtenaw County. The conference will focus on recreation and bring together the local governments, school districts, and major businesses in eastern Washtenaw County to increase our knowledge regarding options and best practices for working together to achieve common goals in recreation.

To support sustainable recreational opportunities in Ypsilanti, the Recreation Commission is promoting and supporting the Ypsilanti Area Recreation Development (YARD). The idea behind YARD is to create one non-profit organization that utilizes all four of the city's facilities and parks and collaborates with other partners (such as EMU). YARD will have six program focus areas: arts/music, education, civic engagement, community service, health/nutrition, and sports/physical activity. By collectively working with all of these sites and program areas, YARD can streamline human resources and fund and organizational development. YARD, as a non-profit organization, would be eligible for several funding streams that the City currently cannot tap. Although much work and further planning is required to move the concept forward, the Recreation Commission is enthusiastic about this approach, and believes it is a model that is unique throughout the country.

Finally, we are all excited by a community-based effort to revamp outdoor ice skating in Ypsilanti. A neighborhood group raised over \$1,500 and constructed an ice rink on the blacktop surface in Recreation Park. Over 35 families made donations to the effort, as did several City Council members, Mayor Farmer, NPNA and a generous contribution by Peter Reinhart of Bombadills. Chief Roberts from the Ypsilanti Fire Department has also been very helpful in the effort. The group finished construction this month and if the weather is cold enough it will be ready by the NPNA General Meeting on January 25.

The Recreation Commission meets the first Thursday of each month at 6:00 PM in City Hall. Public comment is welcome at the beginning of each meeting. WINTER AND FALL OPENINGS AT THE YPSILANTI COOPERATIVE PRESCHOOL

Open House February 28, 1:30-3:30 pm and 6:00-7:00 pm.

Now in its 60th year, the Ypsilanti Cooperative Preschool (YCP) is an Ypsilanti institution that helps parents and children from the city and surrounding communities play and grow together.

Parents run the non-profit school, while a paid educator manages the play-based instruction five mornings per week. The "threes" meet Tuesdays and Thursdays, while the "fours" take the classroom Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Parents take turns assisting the teacher and getting a morning out.

When they're not in the classroom, parents have a quiet moment alone, run errands, or focus on their other children at home. When it's their turn to help out each month, moms and dads read, sing, and dance with up to 20 children; guide teacherdesigned activities; and monitor free play.

Members who have returned year after year until all of their children have gone on to kindergarten praise YCP as a caring environment for children and a great place for parents to form lasting friendships.

Last summer, energetic YCP parents decided it was time for the beloved school to get a facelift. They pitched broken toys, painted walls, installed new carpet, and acquired new furniture. Parents built new bookcases and added a tree mural to complete the sky-blue, grass-green play space.

Housed in the First Baptist Church at 1110 Cross St., YCP is the teaching home of Mieke Giles, who has an Associates Degree in Early Childhood Education and full-day preschool experience.
