NPNA YARD SALE A GREAT SUCCESS

More than 100 Normal Park families signed up to participate in the annual NPNA yard sale on June 3. The modest registration fee of \$10 per household covered the cost of ads, signs and yard sale maps, and serves as the main source of funds for NPNA. Throughout the year, NPNA is able to contribute to community activities and efforts which benefit the neighborhood and the greater Ypsilanti community. Contributions have supported the purchase of flowers and plants for Ypsi Pride Day, the annual ice cream social, the Senior Center, the Rutherford Pool, the Ypsilanti Health Coalition's bike rack project, the Ypsilanti Home Tour and much more.

Neighbors who participate in the yard sale keep the proceeds from their own sales, and many also take this opportunity to support other efforts as well. NORMAL PARK HISTORY

In 1892 James N. Wallace bought the Normal Park Addition and the plat of the Normal Park Addition was recorded by Washtenaw County on December 3, 1892.

The western boundary is behind the houses on the west side of what was then the unnamed Wallace Boulevard. The northern boundary followed a property line along what was called the North Line of the French Claim which is the present day Westmoorland. The early French settlers did not use compass directions to draw property lines. They drew property lines parallel and perpendicular to geographic features. The original northern boundary of Normal Park was an eastward extension of the present day Westmoorland to what is now Cross Street and then was identified as a boulevard. The original plat of Normal Park excluded a rectangle that now includes Hiawatha. The eastern boundary did not include Elm Street north of Grant. Edith Hefley Park was then described as a Court. Elm did mark the eastern boundary from Pearl to Congress and Congress Street was the entire southern boundary.

The 1899 street guide does not mention Wallace Boulevard though it is mention in the 1912 street guide, the next available. Three residences are recorded in 1912. David Budd, a farmer, lived at 1 Wallace. The house still stands and is on the northwest corner of Wallace and Congress. Arthur Barton, an engineer, lived at 215 Wallace. This house is on the southwest corner of Sherman and Wallace. George Willard, travel agent, lived at 321 Wallace. This house now has a 1202 Westmoorland address but originally fronted Wallace. It is curious why the big white house on the southwest corner of Cross and Wallace was not listed in the 1912 street directory since it was built in 1910.

Sherman, Grant, and Pearl are first mentioned in the 1928 street guide. Pearl and Grant were both described as intersecting Wallace, while Sherman Street is described as ending at Wallace.

The archives of the Ypsilanti Historical Museum and Archives contain a wealth of community history including a year-byyear collection of street guides is part of their collection. Examining the street guides reveals when streets were opened and when houses were first occupied.

The Archives are open Monday and Wednesday 9:00 am to 12:00 pm and Sunday 12:00 to 3:00 pm. Closed holiday weekends. The Museum is open 2:00 to 4:00 pm on Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday. Closed holiday weekends. It is located at 220 N. Huron St. Call (734) 482-4990 for more information.
