#### **NPNA GENERAL MEETING**

The next NPNA General Meeting is at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, October 25th at the Senior/Community Center in Recreation

Park.



Erika Julien, Voter Services Director of the League of Women Voters of the Ann Arbor Area, will be our featured speaker. She will be discussing the proposals on the ballot for the Tuesday, November 7, 2006 general election.

Five proposals have been approved for the statewide ballot; there are no local proposals in the City of Ypsilanti. The statewide questions range from a referendum on legislation legalizing dove hunting, to constitutional amendments on affirmative action and eminent domain, to an initiative mandating increased school funding. Several are controversial.

The League of Women Voters (www.lwvmi.org) is a nonpartisan group devoted to increasing citizen participation in government. Founded in 1920, it's one of the most distinguished civic organizations in the country, well-known for its efforts to register and inform voters.

Though the League does not support individual candidates or parties, it does advocate on some issues, and the Michigan LWV opposes two of the five statewide proposals—the Michigan Civil Rights Initiative and the mandatory school funding initiative. Julien's presentation, however, will be informational and nonpartisan, laying out the issues in each proposal and the arguments made by supporters and opponents.

These ballot proposals, particularly those concerning affirmative action, eminent domain, and school funding, will have far-reaching and long-standing effects. Anyone planning to vote in November—and hopefully that is everyone reading this—should take advantage of this opportunity to become better informed about what's involved.

We have also asked the three candidates running for the Ward 2 City Council seat to attend. Peter Hubbard, Bill Nickels, and Tom Bagwell be on hand.

# SENIOR CENTER VIABLE, THANKS TO YOUR GIFTS

One year ago this month it looked as though the Ypsilanti Community/Senior Center in Recreation Park would have to close its doors. Funding from the cash-strapped city budget had dropped to just enough to pay for basic building maintenance and utilities, and a federal grant for an Intergenerational Program, which was paying staff and operational costs, had run out. But thanks to a dedicated group of volunteers and donors, many from the Normal Park Neighborhood, the new Friends' Group has successfully raised enough money to allow the Senior Center to reach its 45th anniversary this year!

A challenge gift of \$5,000 from retired EMU Professor **Don and Nancy Buckeye**, along with a \$10,000 gift from an anonymous donor, put the budget over the top this summer. Along with the previous generosity of many individual donors this year, a \$20,000 grant from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation, and successful fundraisers like the well-attended Rock-a-thon, the Jaycees'-supported rummage sale, the Annual Corn Roast and the Women's Council geranium sale, these newest dollars make it possible to keep the Center's doors open.

Senior Center Coordinator Monica Prince noted that a recently awarded grant of \$5,000 from the Ypsilanti Area Beyer Memorial Health Foundation will now make it possible to expand the Center's exercise and health program.

We hope that all seniors from the neighborhood will take advantage of the array of services and programs that the Center offers. We are also pleased that so many community organizations can use the Center, including Growing Hope and several neighborhood associations, and we look forward to more partnerships in the future.

The NPNA sponsored a candidates forum on Thursday, July 20, to help those voting in the August Primary have better sense of who was running.

# COMMUNITY GARDENING BLOOMS AGAIN IN NORMAL PARK

Community gardening grew in Ypsilanti this year, with another garden installed on Firwood (off Michigan Avenue) and at a local church. Normal Park's two neighborhood gardens, at Recreation Park and West Middle School, also saw new ideas sprout to life.

Lisa Bashert, steward of the Recreation Park garden, planted a "Three Sisters Demonstration Garden," which showed the harmonious relationship between corn, beans and squash, an agricultural method developed by Native Americans many generations ago. This garden was located slightly southeast of the main Rec Park garden, toward the pool. Visitors learned more about the plants' relationship through interpretive signs placed around the perimeter of the garden. Lisa recently harvested 48 ears of corn from the Three Sisters garden to donate to the Plant a Row for the Hungry (PAR) program through Food Gatherers.

Over forty Normal Park area residents gardened this year at West Middle School Community Garden, with both brand new and very experienced gardeners enjoying the full-sun growing space. Visitors to the West Middle School Community Garden will notice a charming new sign, outdoor bulletin board, and bird houses on each fence post. The Plant a Row for the Hungry gardening space was expanded to two full plots this year, thanks to the enthusiastic management of gardeners **Linda Sankovich** and **Marcia Ledford**. As of early September, the Plant a Row for the Hungry plots have yielded over 100 lbs of freshly picked produce for Food Gatherers.

While the community gardens will go to bed for the winter at the end of October, spring will be here before we know it. Stay tuned for information on registering for a plot in early spring 2007!
