NPNA GENERAL MEETING

The NPNA General Meeting is at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, January 31, 2007, at the Senior Center in Recreation Park.

NPNA is very excited to announce that we are having Kathryn Savoie as our keynote speaker at our general meeting.

Kathryn is a colleague in the conservation/environmental community and a key staff person at the Arab American Center for Community and Social Services (ACCESS) in Dearborn. Perhaps most importantly, Kathryn is one of Al Gore's recent trainees regarding his global climate change work and will be presenting to the group on that subject.

In September of last year, Savoie was one of the first 50 people from around the country to be trained as part of the Climate Project, a grassroots educational effort associated with the documentary *An Inconvenient Truth*, which chronicles the growing problem of global warming and Al Gore's efforts to combat it.

She has also included in her presentation data related to Michigan about heat-related deaths and illnesses, the reduction of water levels in the Great Lakes and the threat of mosquito-borne diseases that can come as the insect population increases when colder temperatures don't exist to regulate them.

Savoie includes three recommendations for action. First, talk to somebody about the issue with a sense of urgency.

Second, become aware of your own impact on the environment and act to limit it: reduce the use of hot water, electricity, gas or oil for heating and fuel for cars; drive more fuel-efficient cars and limit airline travel.

Third, contact politicians at every level. Urge local and federal officials to do something about the environmental issues.

"I'm asking people to take some action to create the will for change," she says. "There are a million things you can tell people to do. I think the biggest thing is to have people become conscious," Savoie says.

We are hoping that you will spread the word about the meeting and encourage your neighbors to attend. Kathryn will be using the Gore PowerPoint presentation and it should be a very interesting and engaging night.

SENIOR CENTER PROGRAMS CONTINUE

Thanks in part to a grant from the Beyer Memorial Foundation, the Ypsilanti Senior/Community Center in Recreation Park now offers fitness classes for seniors five days a week.

Mark A. Harris leads our new and already popular exercise class, which start at 9:30 am on Mondays. "What I try to do is get people to make physical activity (exercise) a part of their life, like brushing their teeth and eating", says Mark, who is both an experienced personal trainer and a designer at Federal-Mogul Corp.

Certified by the National Strength and Conditioning Association, Mark grew up in Westland, MI and went to Inkster High School and EMU. As children, Mark and his siblings were guided by their father, who was a coach, to do their chores and also 5-10 push-ups, 10-15 sit-ups, run around the backyard, and then they could go out and play. "Exercise was just part of our regular routine. I want everyone to see physical activity the same way". The class uses weights, exercise balls and other techniques to encourage strength and flexibility.

There is also a line dancing class, Tai Chi, Fitness and Flexibility classes, and a Walking Club. This summer we plan to offer a Water Aerobics class in cooperation with Rutherford Pool as well. All classes are free and suitable for all ability levels.

We encourage everyone in the neighborhood who is aged 55 or over to stop by the Center to check out these and the other senior programs: Cooking 101, a new Book Discussion Club, craft and service projects and much more. Several neighbors are already active at the Center, as participants and volunteers. Andrea Linn teaches a popular cooking class once a month, Gerry Butterwick has entertained us with piano and guitar on several occasions, and Corky Pitts is a super-talented quilter. We encourage everyone to check it out. Lunch is served daily as well, through the Washtenaw County ESTC program, for a modest donation of \$2.50.

We are also enjoying new partnerships with young people, including several presentations and projects with Chapelle School; help from high school and college students from Ypsilanti High School's Key Club and EMU's Circle K (the student branches of Kiwanis Club International, who are helping with painting and other projects); and a wonderful intergenerational exchange when a neighborhood infants' play group meets every Saturday morning in the Center along with the Senior Quilting Group. YPSILANTI POLICE ACTIVITY UPDATE - JAN 2006

From Ypsilanti Police Chief Matt Harshberger in an update to the CoPAC representatives January 8, 2007.

I wanted to provide an update to let everyone know where things stand. If you saw the Ann Arbor News article on January 7 about Washtenaw County Jail overcrowding, you probably got a snapshot as to what we've been doing for the past couple of weeks, but there's a little more than just that.

First, here's the update with the county jail. About mid-December I received a fax machine from the sheriff's department that the county jail was no longer overcrowded and would accept prisoners. I immediately began conducting the warrant sweeps to arrest all the individuals that we had put on the list of jail refusals since September. The sweeps have been very productive as the newspaper article indicated and we are continuing to look for the individuals that are now hiding because they know the jail is taking arrests.

If you've been keeping track of the jail situation, you probably have learned that Circuit Court Judge Melinda Morris ordered the sheriff to abide by the statutory requirement to reduce sentences by up to 30%. This happened just before I received the fax. Because the jail was no longer overcrowded, the sheriff did not have to reduce sentences, but the end result was that we were able to lodge arrests again and we have been taking advantage of the opportunity to get offenders and reoffenders off the streets.

Additionally, there was an increase in burglaries from mid-December to the end of December in the Midtown NA and Riverside NA areas. Fortunately, we were able to catch the two main suspects while they were in the middle of a burglary on Ballard St. The apprehension of these two suspects (great job by the responding YPD officers) led to investigations that resulted in the resolution of approximately a dozen burglaries the two had committed in the previous two weeks. Both perpetrators are Ypsilanti Township residents and are currently in custody. It is very nice to report that we did not have a burglary in several days - since Jan. 4th - so we feel the arrests of these two individuals and the arrests of the many subjects from warrant sweeps has done much to address the individuals committing burglaries and/or larcenies in the city unfortunately we would be foolish to believe that it will last for long.

As for the several street robberies that had been occurring over the past month, YPD officers tracked down and arrested a primary suspect involved in a street robbery. This perpetrator has been charged with four counts; Unarmed Robbery, Assault w/intent to Rob while Unarmed, Assault on a Police Officer and Receiving & Concealing Stolen Property. We issued a press release and we are investigating further on the other robberies to determine if he is the suspect that was involved in those. This individual is a Detroit resident, but was living with his sister here in the city.

After a changeover in reporting software, we will soon be up and running again with the weekly crime statistics online at ypsilantipolice.org

As you can see from this note, as well as from the Ann Arbor News article, we have been extremely busy over the past few weeks trying to get things under control with regard to crimes that had been occurring in the community. I think we have made considerable progress, but we have much more work to do. Rest assured that YPD will continue to work hard at keeping Ypsilanti a safe and enjoyable community to live and work.

I sincerely appreciate CoPAC's steadfast support of the YPD and the work we are doing. I also appreciate all the hard work the police officers, detectives and command staff have been doing on the streets to get things cleaned up. Thank you all!!
